After the lockdown was announced, I honestly did not know if I would survive till the end. I was not afraid of the virus; I was afraid ofbeing locked in with the men of my family and to endure the same abuse without the chance of escape.

2021 STRATEGY

UNFPA in Syria, operating through both Syria and Turkey Cross-Border offices, will continue working to increase the availability of and access to sexual and reproductive health services throughout Syria, in addition to providing comprehensive GBV prevention and response services to people in need. Integration of reproductive health and gender-based violence services will continue to be expanded in Syria and through Turkey Cross-Border through service delivery points and mobile outreach teams, while improving the quality of gender-based violence prevention and response activities at women's and girls' safe spaces. Moreover, UNFPA will continue working towards making facilities disability-friendly.

Through its office in Damascus, UNFPA Syria will continue 2020 pilot projects on cash and voucher assistance (CVA) to ensure the most vulnerable populations have access to essential goods and services. UNFPA will also pilot engaging men in accountable practices and social norms change programmes, and will build capacity of service providers to provide comprehensive mental health and psychosocial support counselling and other services.

Through its Turkey Cross-Border operations, UNFPA will continue to respond to the increasingly volatile humanitarian situation northwestern Syria, with a focus on meeting the urgent and growing needs of internally displaced persons and other people in need. The response will see a continuation and expansion of support to local women's organizations in the region, including the expansion of CVA initiatives to encompass GBV case management and the implementation of GBV structured prevention activities with women, men, boys, and girls, UNFPA will also work towards expanding specialized adolescent girls programming, with a focus on cultivating awareness, empowerment, and agency.

Meanwhile, UNFPA will continue to support the national response to COVID-19, focusing on ensuring continuity of services despite restrictions and mitigating the emerging needs of women, girls, and young people in light of the pandemic. As of late 2020, the steadily rising number of infections clearly shows that the epidemiological situation in Syria is rapidly evolving. Specialized programmes have been developed to guarantee women and girls access to essential SRH services to avoid preventable loss of life, in addition to addressing the escalating risks of gender-based violence as a result of movement restrictions and the escalating economic crisis in the country.

2021 STRATEGY

UNFPA Egypt will continue to support primary, secondary, and tertiary healthcare, including reproductive health and family planning services, for Syrian refugees and the Egyptian host community through equal and nondiscriminatory access. In 2021, despite continuing challenges of COVID-19 and related concerns, secondary and tertiary healthcare for Syrian refugees, particularly pregnant women with complications, will be a key priority. Additionally, efforts to reduce and mitigate the impacts of gender-based violence will be made by strengthening access to legal, medical, psychosocial, and emergency shelter services. UNFPA Egypt will continue to strengthen community-based protection and community-led activities to address GBV, along with developing governmental capacities to respond and provide refugee-friendly services.

In terms of its response to COVID-19, UNFPA Egypt has adapted and adjusted programmes to ensure that the emerging essential needs are met, including the provision of dignity and hygiene kits for Syrian communities in Egypt. In addition, the safe spaces are adapting their community-based approach to be implemented remotely through online and social media tools. The programme includes new interventions such as COVID-19 awareness raising through short videos over social media. In addition, hygiene and dignity kits are provided to Syrian refugees living in COVID-19 hot spot areas.

UNFPA Iraq provides comprehensive reproductive health services for refugees, displaced populations, and host communities. In 2021, UNFPA will continue to work with government counterparts and local actors to build their capacities and ensure continuity of services, including through the COVID-19 pandemic. UNFPA Iraq will continue providing gender-based violence services while working with the government to improve and implement national GBV policies while developing responses to emerging and growing GBV and child marriage concerns throughout the country.

To adapt to COVID-19, UNFPA is working with the Government of Iraq and the Kurdistan Regional Government to ensure that essential services are still being provided, in addition to working consistently to mitigate the impact of the pandemic on SRH supplies including modern contraceptives, maternal health medicines, and personal protective equipment (PPE).

2021 STRATEGY

UNFPA Jordan will expand, strengthen, and integrate gender-based violence and sexual and reproductive health services through multiple means in 2021, having adapted several service delivery methods to remote modalities during the pandemic and by embedding case management teams with health outreach teams. UNFPA Jordan will also pilot the Adolescent Girls Against All Odds approach for pregnant adolescent girls and adolescent mothers, as well as expanding a pilot cash assistance programme for GBV survivors. Through its youth programming, UNFPA Jordan will continue developing sexual and reproductive health and rights and comprehensive sexuality education along with youth, government partners, and other key stakeholders. UNFPA Jordan will build on efforts along the humanitarian-development nexus throughout its programming while supporting women, youth, peace, and security activities.

In terms of adapting to COVID-19, UNFPA Jordan identified key disruption risks and scenarios to provide a framework on determining essential life-saving activities and functions to continue operating despite the pandemic, and restrictions on movement. Programmes and work plans for 2021 have also been comprehensively designed to adjust to the new challenges posed by the pandemic and ensure continuity of operations across SRH, GBV and youth responses.

2021 STRATEGY

UNFPA Lebanon will scale up and enhance sexual and reproductive health, through support to health centers and clinics, and with the integration of SRH services at women's and girls' safe spaces. Gender-based violence services will continue to be strengthened, including case management and psychosocial support, and UNFPA will increase programming targeting adolescents and youth, including supporting youth-led initiatives to support local communities affected by the compounded crises.

UNFPA will also pilot cash assistance for gender-based violence and sexual and reproductive health programming to address the needs of the most vulnerable populations, which is especially important given the dire economic situation and increased needs in the country. UNFPA Lebanon will enhance social inclusion of marginalized groups, including persons with disabilities and the LGBTQI+ community, at all service points. Lastly, UNFPA Lebanon will continue to improve the quality of remote service provision and develop guidelines and tools for partners based on good practices and field experiences collected in 2020.

2021 STRATEGY

UNFPA in Turkey will focus on ensuring continued access to sexual and reproductive health services through existing service delivery channels, in addition to investing in building the capacity of service providers and delivering essential supplies. Through its various specialized units, UNFPA will also continue to make genderbased violence programmes available to women, girls, youth, and to the most vulnerable refugee groups, including LGBTQI individuals, sex workers, refugees living with HIV, refugees with disabilities, and men and boys who are either survivors or at risk of sexual violence.

To adapt to the needs emerging due to COVID-19, UNFPA Turkey's service providers prioritised awareness raising activities on COVID-19 among beneficiaries through regular information sharing, primarily via phone. UNFPA has also started conducting bi-weekly online supervision and coordination meetings for personnel of the six WGSSs as well as IP managers to enable experience and information sharing between all partners and strengthen their capacities for better service provision.

Project Highlight

UNFPA has been supporting four Youth Centres in Turkey which provide essential and lifesaving health and protection services to young refugee women and men. Especially with the COVID-19 pandemic, where resources are diverted to the overall health crisis, vulnerable refugees are at risk of being left behind since there are not specialized resource allocations to ensure continuation of such services and activities for young refugees within the mainstream humanitarian response. If these centres are not funded in 2021, it is estimated that almost 4,500 young refugees, most of whom are neither in education nor in employment, will have less access to protection and GBV services while 6,000 young refugees will have less access to health, specifically SRH, services. For this purpose, there will be a need to allocate around USD 500,000 in order to ensure the continuation of the four Youth Centers for one year.

2021 STRATEGY

In 2021, the UNFPA Palestine Country Office will work to strengthen essential services for SRH and GBV, with a particular view to mitigating the socioeconomic impacts of COVID-19, and with a focus on strengthening systems for preparedness, response, and coordination, as well as filling gaps in the health system. Efforts to prevent sexual exploitation and abuse will be scaled up across the humanitarian programme.

The SRH response will focus on advocacy and support (technical and financial) to the Ministry of Health and major service providers on continuation of essential SRH services, and will scale up access to holistic services for vulnerable groups including people in Gaza Area C, and people with disabilities. Mobile clinics, which integrate GBV and youth friendly health services, and are the only health services available to people in Area C, will be scaled up. Access to family planning services, which has been impacted by COVID-19, will be prioritized. The Palestine Country Office will further seek to expand the role of midwives in providing essential SRH services, as health staff such as doctors and nurses are often re-allocated from SRH services to COVID-19, and is seeking to deploy alternative approaches such as telemedicine. UNFPA will work with MOH to enhance SRH coordination through SRH Working Group and the health cluster.

In the area of GBV, UNFPA Palestine will strengthen and scale up GBV services, especially mental health and psychosocial support (MHPPS) and cash and voucher assistance, for which there is a particular need following the onset of the COVID pandemic. Improved data collection will be targeted through the GBV Information Management System (GBVIMS). UNFPA will continue to strengthen coordination efforts and ensuring the quality of GBV services through capacity building on remote service provision, Inter-Agency GBV Minimum Standards, and support to GBV service providers for the development of contingency plans.

2021 STRATEGY

Somalia continues to face one of the most complex, fragile, and protracted humanitarian crises in the world. At least 5.9 million people are projected to be in need of humanitarian assistance through 2021 due to the impact of recurrent climatic shocks, armed conflict, protracted displacement, and socioeconomic factors, amid the global COVID-19 pandemic and desert locust infestation. About 2.6 million people live in protracted displacement. With the impact of COVID-19 over the course of 2020, an estimated 20% of the Somali population (2.5 million) will need to be reached with some form of COVID-19 response over the course of the coming year.

To respond to these critical needs, UNFPA Somalia Country Office will mobilize resources to ensure the continuity and access of quality lifesaving multi-sectoral interventions with reproductive health and genderbased violence components as well as supporting the data and engagement of youth in a humanitarian context. The programme's interventions will target most vulnerable including displaced persons, women at reproductive age, pregnant women, adolescents, GBV survivors, and persons with disabilities. The interventions will also aim at strengthening the implementation of Minimum Initial Service Package (MISP) in Somalia, SRH and GBV coordination leadership and the capacity of GBV and health service providers to enable them to respond to the growing needs.

UNFPA Somalia works with around 50 partners, over half of whom are local organizations, who provide broad geographic coverage for programme implementation, including in hard-to-reach and insecure areas. These organizations have built trust in local communities and provide much needed healthcare and GBV services in some conflict-prone areas. UNFPA is an active member of coordination fora such as the Humanitarian and UN country teams, as well as cluster-based mechanisms, for health and protection, which support the identification of needs and response coordination. As the humanitarian threats continue to aggravate challenges in Somalia, with women and girls bearing the brunt of the crisis, UNFPA and its partners will continue to advocate for resources to address the needs of vulnerable women and girls.

2021 STRATEGY

In 2021, UNFPA Libya's humanitarian response to the complex context in the country will focus on three main sectors targeting vulnerable Libyans, especially displaced and conflict-affected people; migrants; and refugeess through tailored interventions. UNFPA will work with the Ministry of Health, the health sector, and other national and international partners on increasing access to gender-responsive sexual and reproductive health services that meet human rights standards for quality and equity. UNFPA aims to prevent excess neonatal and maternal mortality and morbidity through: i) supporting the health system in the country, building up on the reproductive, maternal, neonatal, child, and adolescent health strategy; ii) assuring continuity of RH service provision in the most affected areas through provision of medical supplies, human resources and capacity building, and health information flow; iii) increasing access to services through community outreach as well as community and system resilience to future risks.

UNFPA is working with other GBV sub-sector members to scale up and establish comprehensive GBV prevention and response services, especially in conflict-affected areas where these services are missing. UNFPA will also increase advocacy efforts for establishing protective legal mechanisms for women and girls, to end impunity for perpetrators and strengthen access to detention facilities. UNFPA will also work with the National Statistical Office and humanitarian partners on updating and improving quality of humanitarian population data. In 2021, UNFPA is aiming at revising the Common Operational Datasets for Population Statistics to allow for better targeting of most vulnerable people and for harmonized data sources for both humanitarian and development actors in Libya.

Without humanitarian assistance, 50% of currently functional health facilities in severely impacted areas might collapse which would impact more than 280,000 women of reproductive age, increasing maternal mortality and unwanted pregnancies. Moreover, in the absence of protection services, thousands of GBV survivors will be deprived of psychosocial first aid, case management, and specialized services including legal aid. Migrants and refugees would be further exposed to arbitrary detention and GBV.

2021 STRATEGY

UNFPA will continue its critical role in the overall humanitarian response in Yemen, providing lifesaving reproductive health and protection services while also strengthening the health systems to provide vital lifesaving reproductive health services, including emergency obstetric and neonatal care to reduce maternal morbidity and mortality. In the country. As the sole provider of lifesaving reproductive health medicines in Yemen, the strengthened reproductive health supply chain will continue to serve as a lifeline to the millions of women and girls. In addition, UNFPA will continue its support to strengthen mechanisms to protect women and girls, focusing on the prevention and response to gender-based violence, while providing leadership to the GBV sub-cluster. UNFPA will also continue to reach newly displaced persons and the most destitute returnees with emergency lifesaving packages in partnership with UNICEF and WFP through the UN Rapid Response Mechanism, which UNFPA currently leads.

As a frontline responder to COVID-19 pandemic, UNFPA will work closely with other frontline partners, helping to mitigate the spread of the disease, while ensuring the protection of health workers and people accessing reproductive health services. This will be done through provision of personal protective equipment and supplies to frontline health workers, enhancing infection control in RH and GBV service delivery points, and strengthening remote programming and reducing physical interaction in all UNFPA supported facilities.

The continued military conflict, reduced funding, a non-permissive operating environment, and a shrinking humanitarian space are expected to challenge the delivery of humanitarian assistance in 2021.
